# Second Grade Reading

#### Balanced Literacy

We use the Balanced Literacy approach to teach literacy in the classroom. Our second grade literacy block consists of the following areas:


- Word Work We follow the Words their Way program. Students are given a spelling inventory to assess knowledge of spelling patterns. Students are then placed in developmentally appropriate groups to study and practice different spelling patterns.
- **Reader's Workshop** Teachers model reading skills and strategies through a mini-lesson and students practice with teacher support and independently.
  - o Independent reading Students read "just right" books and practice reading skills and strategies independently. Students write about his/her reading.
  - Guided reading groups/strategy groups Teachers work with small groups of students who are on the same reading level or who need practice in a certain reading skill or strategy.

Conferring – Teachers read with students one on one and identify goals for that

student to work on as a reader.

 Partner work – Students work with a partner to read or discuss texts.

Interactive Read Aloud/Shared Reading –
Teacher models comprehension strategies
through a read aloud or the students and
teacher share the reading of a text while the
students are guided and supported.



• **Speaking and Listening** skills are woven throughout all of these areas to strengthen and practice academic conversations.

## Stopping and Jotting

We teach students to "stop and jot" using symbols to record his/her thinking about a text.

### Using Rubrics to Grade

Second grade end of unit literacy assessments will use a rubric to grade student's written responses. Below is a sample question and rubric:

What do you think the word courage means? Which strategy did you use to figure out the meaning?

0	1	2	3
No Answer	Answer is incorrect or off topic.	Student identifies the correct meaning of 'courage' but gives a vague strategy or no strategy at all.	Student gives a strong definition for 'courage' and elaborates on their strategy.
